
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Chalmers Neighbourhood Area Boundaries



MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

Recalling the Treaty relationships formalized over a century ago in partnership with the Anishinaabe, Cree, Oji-Cree, Dakota and Dene peoples, as well as our location in the birthplace of the Metis Nation, we strive to live up to our ongoing responsibility to the earth, the water and the people in the Chalmers neighbourhood, and continually renew our commitment to leaving each better off than when we arrived. In the past year, a parklet was tested on Watt St, and we hosted Elmwood's first ever Night Market. Look for more projects in the coming year on Henderson Hwy and around the neighbourhood!

This coming year will mark the last in our 5-year neighbourhood plan, after which we'll develop a new plan, our third in all. Since the beginning, our approach has been, and will continue to be, incremental in nature. Knowing that we can't solve every problem at once, and also that not every problem can be solved in one go, we aim to always start where we are at, with the resources we have, humbly observe where people in the neighbourhood are struggling, then take the next smallest step we can take right now to ease that struggle. Then repeat that process the next day, and every day. After 10 years, we hope you feel as much progress has been made as we do.

As this marks the end of my term, I want to thank all the other invaluable Board volunteers with whom I've enjoyed working, and from whom I've learned so much, over these past 6 years. And of course, my deepest, heartfelt appreciation goes out to all of our smart, creative, and unbelievably dedicated staff. They are the ones putting these bold ideas into action every single day. We owe them our sincerest gratitude, and I'm thankful to have had the chance to witness firsthand their passion for bettering our neighbourhood.

Action Plan & Housing Support for 2021-2022 Liz Plett, Housing Support/ Action Plan Coordinator

Housing Support

- ✓ Supported 79 renters, 20 homeowners and 8 landlords in Chalmers with advocacy, completing forms, bedbug supplies, referrals to resources, free cellphones, free income tax returns, free meals, information sessions, RentSmart courses and more!
- ✓ Beyond-repair Garage Demolitions grants of \$1,200 each for 5 homeowners. Program completed in 2021.
- ✓ RentSmart Basics sessions saw 30 participants learning how to avoid eviction and receiving Letter of Completion to use as reference letters!
- √ 8 DIY Home Repair workshops for 108 participants and \$900 in gift cards for door prizes.
- ✓ Bulky Waste Drop-Offs saw 6.5 tonnes of bulky waste removed free of charge for 58 Chalmers households.
- ✓ Graffiti referral, grass-cutting and litter pickup performed on a weekly basis in summer of 2021.

Plan for 2022-23: Continue supporting community members with basic needs, deliver Urgent / Emergency Home Repair Grants for homeowners and landlords.













Improving Safety

- ✓ Conducted an Exterior Housing Audit (2800 homes), Business Audit (81 small businesses) and 320 Safety Surveys for all of Chalmers to determine need for safety improvements and home repairs!
- ✓ Worked hard to prevent discrimination by commemorating children harmed in residential schools in Canada, distributing *We Are One* lawn signs, and hiring staff to research and make recommendations for Truth and Reconciliation and Cultural Competency in all of our programs and more.
- ✓ Bear Clan Elmwood Patrol walked 77 times with 399 volunteers for over 500 kms. Disposed of 2400 needles, 50 potential weapons, 95 cracked pipes and 30 pill bottles.
- ✓ Warming Centre and Vaccine Clinics provided for the neighbourhood

Plan for 2022-23: Hire a new Patrol Coordinator and recruit volunteers for *Elmwood Safety Patrol*, continue to incorporate Truth & Reconciliation Calls to Action, deliver *Safer Cleaner Chalmers* information sessions.

Free Events

- ✓ 8 Munroe Farmers Markets at Holy Eucharist Parish Centre with 10-12 vendors per market and up to 400 attendees per market.
- ✓ Reimagine Elmwood Coordinator hired. Operated Watt Street Parklet with live music and collected 300 surveys on street safety.

Plan for 2022-23: Organize Elmwood Night Markets, Farmers Markets, Happy Days on Henderson, Elmwood Winter Fun Day, Reimagine Elmwood events, and utilize 243 Henderson Highway as a welcoming public space.







Affordable Housing

- ✓ Chalmers Homebuyer Assistance program assisted 5 families with Home Readiness information sessions and \$14,000 down payments on 5 Chalmers homes.

Better Access to Groceries

Jacquie Pontedeira, BAG Coordinator and Facility Manager

The Better Access to Groceries (BAG) program is now in its 7th year. The program was developed from the need in the area for fresh produce for families. We currently accept membership from the Chalmers/Elmwood/Glenelm areas.

Due to Covid, the program took place out of 180 Poplar for the month of April, then we resumed regular programming out of Chalmers Community Centre.

We are grateful for the support of our many partners: Chalmers Community Centre; Sobeys Cash & Carry; Community Venture; MB Housing - 53 Stadacona; Legion Gardens - 675 Talbot; Columbus House; Kildonan Horizons; Holy Eucharist Church; KMTS Thrift Store; Riverwood Church Community; Daniel Blaikie MP; Healthy Together Now; EEKALC; ECRC.

The BAG Program would not exist without the support of our amazing volunteers, who show up through heat, rain, snowstorm, frigid temps, and pandemics!

The Together in Elmwood Parent Child Coalition, now referred to as Chalmers Neighbourhood Renewal Early Years Programming is an important part of programming available to parents and families in Elmwood and beyond. It provides children aged 0-6. The Coalition has had many partners including, Elmwood East Kildonan Active Living Center, Elmwood Community Resource Centre, Manitoba Metis Federation, Ma Wawi Wi Ci Itata, Winnipeg Regional Health Authority, Winnipeg School Division, City of Winnipeg, and The Chalmers Neighbourhood Renewal Corporation. Each organization supported the coalition with valuable resources and promotional support. The East Kildonan Active Centre has supported us by giving us a stable place to use for our Drop-In program as well as most of our other events and activities. The Chalmers Neighbourhood Renewal Corporation as well as the Winnipeg Regional Health Authority have provided our program with Granting opportunities to help enhance some of the programming that has been offered.

Due to Public Health restrictions, the in person Drop-in program was put on hold indoors until September 2021. From April until July, we offered outdoor programming as well as virtual options for our families. We would deliver crafts and activities to our families in addition to reading stories and posting the videos on social media. For the first few weeks in April, we were able to offer Outdoor programming at a variety of parks in the Elmwood area- however Public Health restrictions were changed mid-April and forced us to put all in person programming on hold. By the time July rolled around, outdoor restrictions were lifted enough for us to be able to restart our Tuesday and Thursday morning Drop-in, which we held behind 180 Poplar on the school field. To offer more options for our families we added a few Saturdays and a Wednesday evening program. In September indoor capacity limits changed once again and programming resumed. We offered programming every Tuesday and Thursday morning from 9:15-11:30 as well as two Saturdays a month.







Community Kitchen

Thanks to a grant from Healthy Together Now, In June we offered a Community Kitchen to all residents of Elmwood/East Kildonan. We chose to highlight a variety of breakfasts from around the globe. We chose meals from the Philippines, France, Costa Rica, Mexico, East Africa, and Canada. Participants picked up a package of ingredients from the center and were then supplied the recipe and a zoom link. On cooking day participants joined me via Zoom and we cooked all the meal together or participants watched and cooked after. For this program we partnered with the Elmwood East Kildonan Active Living Centre who offered their kitchen for us to be able cook these meals. We chose to offer this program as families are always looking for new ideas to add to their meal planning process, and as Chalmers Neighbourhood Renewal Corporation was also celebrating the diversity of the community, we chose to highlight foods from other countries. The target population of this community was families of any shape or size. We planned to offer this to 10 families, so we first looked to the TIE community for participants, and then to the community of Elmwood to fill all our spots. Many families have commented on how it was so inspiring to see what other cultures had for breakfast, many including myself still make some of these dishes on a regular basis. This was a great program. The meals we made were Quiche Lorraine from France, Mandazi from East Africa, Gallo Pinto from Costa Rica, Huevos Rancheros from Mexico, Tortang Giniling from the Philippines, and from Canada we did a big "trucker" breakfastpancakes from scratch, homemade hashbrowns, bacon, sausages and we showed how to cook 9 different types of eggs.

Since our Community Kitchens were so popular and families were asking for more, we offered 5 more sessions in the Spring of 2022. We had the opportunity to offer these as in person or as virtual session. All participants joined us virtually. For this round we did simple "Kid friendly" dishes, Lasagne cupcakes, Mexican Turkey Roll Ups, Pizza Pasta Casserole, Baked Potato Soup as well as Bacon Cheeseburger Pasta. We were able to offer this to a total of 14 families, who once again are asking for more. We are hoping to resume in Fall 2022 with more sessions.





Community Kitchen Series

Chalmers News and Social Media Engagement

Chalmers News informs 1,300 recipients about free programs and events in Chalmers and the broader community of Elmwood every month. Chalmers News is available to community members through hand mail and online newsletters.

CNRC's programs and services are mainly posted in Facebook through local community Facebook groups and by our partnered organizations. In the last year, CNRC's Facebook page reached 29,260 people and increased page visitors by 130.9%. Other platforms that we use to inform community members are Instagram, NextDoor, and Canada Post Precision Targeter and putting up posters in the local businesses in Elmwood.



Learn About Technology

The "Learn about Technology" program has contributed to our community in a number of ways, from simple connections with loved ones, all the way to online banking. The "Learn about Technology" program aims to (but is not limited to) improving communication, increasing knowledge of technological devices and helping individuals adapt to our fast and technology-driven world.


This program is offered everyday between the hours of 9am until 3pm, by appointment or drop-ins. We have helped 30+ individuals since the start of 2022.

This program is individualized to participants needs and strives to work around challenges that come by every individual. Worksheets are provided. Booklets with more detail are given depending on the complexity of the questions and on a need basis. Additional materials are given based upon request. Lastly, this program is also available virtually and through the phone if clients have mobility issues or are not able to meet for an in-person appointment.

This program fits the Chalmers Five-Year Plan as it increases access to recreation and wellness opportunities. Through this program, CNRC is developing accessible resources and services for community members of vulnerable populations.

Last fiscal year the major issue for the program was the need for additional help. This year someone has been hired which has helped tremendously. With the COVID-19 situation getting better, our programs are coming back fully. As great as this is, this comes with some issues for our Learning with Technology appointments. The environment can be distracting and noisy with most rooms being booked. The current solution to this issue is to only accept clients during quieter times between 9am-10am and after 3pm. Unfortunately, this limits the time we are able to help our clients.

In order to improve this program and continue helping those in need, there needs to be a dedicated time and space for us to execute the program in.





Energy Efficiency

In November of 2021, we started a new partnership with Efficiency Manitoba. Since then, we have been canvassing the Chalmers neighbourhood to let them know they are pre-approved for the Energy Efficiency Assistance Program. With this program, our goal is to make homes more energy efficient in Chalmers by offering free insulation upgrades, and heavily subsidized heating system upgrades. This helps the neighbourhood by improving the homes and the residents' lives by lowering their bills and making their homes more comfortable.

The need for this program was determined based on the success of this program running in the North End, which is a very similar neighborhood as Chalmers. Both Chalmers and the North End have older homes and fixed income residents. By partnering with Efficiency Manitoba we can promote the program and help our residents access home energy savings.

From November to March, we pre-qualified **189 homes** and helped **18 homes** apply for the EEAP. We saw a response rate of 10% on our end, though more homes may be applying on their own without reaching out to us. We also hosted a few workshops in the winter to inform the community about this initiative, and we were able to help several homes connect with the program.

Going Forward:

As we continue throughout the year, we are canvassing two blocks a week, and are anticipating reaching over a thousand homes by the end of summer, and many more throughout the year. With a current average response rate of 18% of homes taking applications, we will be assisting hundreds of homes with insulation upgrades, heating system upgrades, and savings on their hydro bills.





Small Grants Fund 2021/22 Recipients

Elmwood Pulse Project (Elmwood Community High School)

The Elmwood Pulse Project provided an opportunity for students at Elmwood High School to participate in an after-school cooking program. Students in this program prepared various meals and stored them in order to consume as their lunch the following day. The purpose for this program is for students to have the opportunity to build community through meal preparation and consumption of healthy balanced meals. While the students engaged in meal preparation, staff volunteers prepared a balanced dinner for all participants to gather at a table setting and enjoy a meal together as a community.

Manitoba Alliance of Parents and Caregivers

Breakfast with Santa is tailored to but not limited to children with special needs who require a patient and judgment-free environment to visit with Santa. This project allowed families with special needs meet others with the same concerns and needs to gather and connect with one another. The purpose of this project is to promote inclusivity amongst parents with special needs children that need a community of their peers to seek support and guidance from one another.









Columbus House

The Columbus House provided 20 weekly sessions of chair yoga to seniors aged 55 and older. The importance of this program is to encourage seniors to be part of a community especially during times of isolation from family due to Covid-19 restrictions. The purpose of organizing weekly chair yoga sessions is to improve the mental health of isolated seniors as well as to reduce stress in times of uncertainty. This project ensured inclusivity amongst all seniors regardless of age and skills.

Small Grants Fund 2021/22 Recipients

Together in Elmwood Parent Child Coalition

All families with children aged 0-6 were able to join CNRC's Early Years for holiday celebrations, Pumpkin Decorating, Gingerbread House Decorating, Winter Sleigh Ride. These projects provided families an opportunity to partake in a variety of activities that would allow parents to connect with other parents and create some lasting memories.









Elmwood Business Coalition

The Elmwood Business Coalition hired a social media consultant to improve the social media presence for the businesses in Chalmers and broader community of Elmwood. The contract staff raised awareness in many ways that benefited and impacted the start-up for Elmwood BIZ in Elmwood. The consultant hired by Elmwood Business Coalition implemented projects for the Elmwood residents such as the Spring Scavenger Hunt in order to promote and support local businesses in the area.



Winnipeg Re/Act Inc. (Riverwood Church)

Winnipeg Re/Act Inc.'s goal is to provide family and individuals an opportunity to process the complex trauma that led to addiction and learn healthy coping skills. Winnipeg Re/Act Inc.'s project improved mental awareness of students in Chalmers community and helped them gain new perspectives. This reduced the risk to re-offend from addictions and allowed them to build healthy relationships with others in a group setting.

Elmwood Supply Company

Elmwood Supply company The organized a "Special Run Launch Day Event" which showcased merchandise, a revamped physical space, and a community-focused limited run release similar to the La Salle Hotel. Louise Bridge, and Roxy Lane apparel. This event provided an opportunity for students of Elmwood High School to gain experiences to work with other students in the building that they would have never crossed paths with, resulting in building community and relationships within the school. Also, neighbours in the Elmwood community were invited to the workspace where connections among different cultures, ages, and perspectives are shared to support the community.













Elmwood Community Resource Centre Inc.

The Elmwood Community Resource Centre's (ECRC) Lit Winter Break provided youth with physical literacy activities, social-emotional learning opportunities and mental wellness support between the months of December 2021 and March 2022. Professional trainers from Sports Manitoba provided workshops and training on ways youth can maintain an active and healthy lifestyle. The youth participated in physical activities in the first half of the session and then discussed nutrients and diet in the second half of the session.







Small Grants Fund 2021/22 Recipients cont.

Elmwood East Kildonan Active Living Centre (EEKALC)

The Elmwood East Kildonan Active Living Centre (EEKALC) offers a wide set of services for those in need. The funding allowed EEKALC to purchase supplies and equipment for the community to use e.g., washer, dryer, frying pans, commercial stock pots, cutting boards, baking sheets, baking pans, rolling pins, stand mixer, blender, immersion blender and sets of pots and pans. This project allows the whole community, its partners, and members to use the supplies, as well as providing the community a place to wash and dry clothes when they do not have access to a laundromat. The cooking supplies are used for preparation of lunches, frozen meals, programs, services, and community events.



Gaita Dance Company (Colombian Alliance in Manitoba Inc.)

The Gaita Dance Company provides opportunities for children and teenagers to gain self-confidence and build positive relationships by promoting Colombian and Latin American culture through traditional dances and learning the Spanish language. The students met every second Friday to connect and socialize. This program provided opportunities for newcomers for recreation, learning, and active participation.

Bike Winnipeg Inc.

Bike Winnipeg formed a bicycle audit by engaging with passing cyclists about their cycling experiences in the Elmwood Neighbourhood in support for future activities planned for Reimagine Elmwood. Through the Cycling Audit Report, Bike Winnipeg can advocate for better cycling infrastructure for the local cyclists in Chalmers/Elmwood neighbourhood.
